Unsightly NBN Node 'Monuments' in the Middle of Verges

You may have noticed recently that NBN tower boxes 1.2 metres high and occupying 1 square metre of earth have been placed in the middle of Council's verges, blocking the views of our heritage homes and having a detrimental impact on the streetscape. At the moment this is having a very negative impact on the Heritage Protection Area of Mount Lawley. Inglewood and Menora will be next. A box could be coming to your verge.

We have received complaints from members in Clotilde Street, Almondbury Road, Third Avenue and Thongsbridge Street.

We are not against having NBN nodes as part of our streetscape, but have huge concerns about the placement of them and general lack of proper consultation with local councils and the community.

When underground power was installed in Mount Lawley and Coolbinia, careful attention was taken between Western Power and the City of Stirling's engineering section to ensure pole top transformer boxes were re-located to corner (side street) or public reserve locations. We have recently lobbied our Federal Member for Perth, Tim Hammond; State Member for Mount Lawley, Simon Millman and Federal Member for Stirling, Michael Keenan, as well as our Lawley and Inglewood Ward Councillors, asking the following:



- Please inquire what level of approval or consultation has been given or undertaken with the City?
- As Menora, Inglewood and Mount Lawley are a Heritage Protection Area, low impact telecommunication installations that are normally allowed as of right under Federal legislation (such as small mobile phone towers) require consultation and approval. Please advise if the NBN Co Limited is required to follow such procedure with NBN towers in the City's HPAs.
- A little consultation might allow the City to prevent 'node monuments' being positioned in the middle of verges throughout our Heritage Protection Area. What can the City do to ensure this?
