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President's Report

As the newly elected president of the Mt Lawley Society it is my privilege to thank the immediate past president, Mr Tony Separovic, together with the Society's Mr Barrie Patron. Baker, and the outgoing committee members for their efforts and dedication to achievement of the objectives of the Society over the past year.

General Annual Meeting

The year ahead

This year the Society looks forward to consolidating the recent downzoning of some areas of Mt Lawley I believe to R12.5. that consistent R10 zoning densities that ensure single dwelling per lot across all residential areas of Mt Lawley, Menora and Coolbinia, combined with vigorous enforcement of single dwelling restrictive covenants, is the most effective way to preserve the character and quality of life for residents of these The Socisuburbs. is very etv cerned that the City of Stirling is considering a proposal to Town amend its Planning Scheme to empower it to override single dwelling restrictive covenants. The Society and the Ward Rate-payers Association are working together to ensure that such amendments do NOT apply to single dwelling restrictive covenants in Mt Lawley and Menora.

Undergrounding of power lines in parts of Mt Lawley is due to start this year. The Society will actively pursue inclusion of Menora in the next round of the undergrounding project. At the same time the Society is

campaigning for Western Power to meet the costs of undergrounding of the high tension lines along Learoyd Street. This is considered an essential precaution from the perspective of health and safety of Learoyd Street residents and of children attending the local primary school.

Mt Lawley as a suburb extends across three local government boundaries: Perth, Stirling and Bayswater. The Society is working with local precinct groups to ensure that

heritage and character are properly protected by all those local government authorities.

Sarah Hardey was born in Maylands at the recently established "Tranby Farm" in 1837 to Joseph Hardey. She was one of a very large family who were all very strict Methodists and were generous patrons of the Wesleyan Church in William Street. So devout was Joseph Hardey that he averred that none of his daughters should marry any other than a Methodist minister. Only one of the daughters was able to score, so Sarah and her other sisters were never able to marry.

She devoted her life to her

Christian faith and was a generous benefactress. She established "Hardey Lodge" in Robinson Street (later Monmouth Street) in Mount Lawley as a home for 'wayward girls'. When wayward girls later became extinct, the home later became the present nursing home for the elderly.

When "Tranby" was sold in 1913, Sarah built a magnificent two-storeyed home at 23 Lawley Crescent. It was on the peak of the Mt Lawley ridge at 50 m above sea level, commanding panoramic views of the Swan River and Perth. It was sadly demolished in 1977 for "Cobblestone Court".

PATRON'S REPORT

It is early days yet to make a judgment on the performance of the new Gallop administration in the local government, planning and heritage areas. The government is obviously mainly pre-occupied with it major restructure of the public service flowing from its reform of the ministries.

One signal that has come out is that the Minister for Planning is keen to abolish the process of planning appeals made directly to her. The Mount Lawley experience has been that, in the past, this process has often favoured bending the rules to suit the developer, and has rarely put heritage first. Of course, a lower-level tribunal can act in the same way if the personnel on it are so minded and the backing legislation is loose, as prevails at the moment.. However a promise has been made for clearer legislation that will protect heritage more strongly.

The latter will go a great way toward correcting the situation where the developer will often go as far as possible to persuade council officers, the council and the Minister to interpret regulations in the most favourable way for him, hopefully with maximum discretion taken in areas of interpretation.

Underground Power Update

Unfortunately the commencement of the undergrounding of low voltage distribution lines in the Mt Lawley area is approximately 6 months behind schedule, with the start date now expected in August/September 2001.

The Mt Lawley Society has been active in lobbying the City of Stirling and local councillors for heritage style street lighting poles in lieu of the standard Western Power lighting poles. Heritage lighting poles have been adopted in a number of localities such as Subiaco, Nedlands and Bayswater. The use of heritage poles in the Mt Lawley area would be aesthetically

appealing and add to the character of the area.

The additional cost for the heritage poles would be in the order of \$30 to \$40 per household. This represents a small percentage increase on the total cost per household.

To date the City of Stirling has not been supportive of the heritage lighting poles despite the strong public support for the heritage poles. Since the additional cost of the heritage poles would be borne by the householders the Society cannot understand the reason for the City's objection to the heritage poles. The City

of Stirling however has agreed to install decorative street nameplate brackets in lieu of the standard Western Power nameplate brackets. After consultation with the City of Stirling Heritage Advisory Committee it has been agreed that the lighting poles will be coloured black.

The Mt Lawley Society is continuing discussions with the local councillors and the City of Stirling for the adoption of the heritage lighting poles. All members who agree with the use of heritage lighting poles are urged to call our local councillors Rod Willox and Trevor Clarey to lodge their support for the heritage poles.

Undergrounding of High Voltage Transmission Lines—Learoyd Street Mount Lawley

In June 2001 the Mt Lawley Society made a submission in favour of undergrounding of the high voltage overhead power transmission lines in Learoyd Street Mt Lawley between Walcott Street and Ferrar Street (a distance of approximately 500m).

Although the Mt Lawley Society is concerned about the offensive visual impact of the Learoyd Street high voltage towers on the character and amenity of the Mt Lawley area, the Society is primarily concerned with the health and safety implications of these powerlines on local residents of Learoyd Street, and especially vulnerable people such as young children attending the local primary school in Learoyd Street and elderly residents. The Society drew attention to the findings and recommendations in the Report of Senate Inquiry into Electromagnetic Radia-

tion regarding location of high voltage/tension electricity lines. The Senate Committee Chair recommended (Recommendation 2.2) that:

Precautionary measures for the placement of powerlines be up-graded to include wide buffer zones, and undergrounding and shielding cables where practicable.

In evidence to the Inquiry Dr Repacholi of the World Health Organisation stated:

The most worrying to me is the residential studies where children living near powerlines seem to have a higher incidence of leukaemia'

A recent report from the chairman of the UK's National Radiological Protection Board's Advisory Group on Non-ionising Radiation, epidemiologist Sir Richard Doll, cited to the Inquiry, concluded:

There is, however, some epidemiological evidence that prolonged exposure to higher levels of power frequency magnetic fields is associated with a small risk of leukaemia in children. ...the possibility remains that intense and prolonged exposures to magnetic fields can increase the risk of leukaemia in children'.

The Society considers that the high voltage overhead power lines in Learoyd Street Mt Lawley represent one of the worst cases of such lines being situated in a location exposing children and local residents to avoidable health and safety risks. Therefore the undergrounding of these lines should be a high priority task for Western Power.

The location of high voltage transmission lines along Learoyd Street:

a narrow residential street;

with homes in that street predominantly facing Learoyd Street rather than side streets; the lack of any effective buffer such as wide verges or parkland; and

the situation of St Paul's primary school in that street,

represents one of the worst examples of poor public infrastructure planning in the Perth metropolitan area from the point of view of public health and safety.

The current undergrounding of power program for Mt Lawley presents to Western Power the most cost-effective opportunity to replace underground the above-ground high voltage transmission lines along Learoyd Street.

The Society intends to campaign over the coming months during the undergrounding program for low voltage distribution lines in the Mt Lawley area in favour of the concurrent undergrounding of the high voltage transmission lines along Learoyd Street Mt Lawley. The Mt Lawley Society encourages members to voice their concerns to their local members of parliament, councillors and Western Power.
