# MLS PRESIDENT'S REPORT

Whilst the property boom brought with it an increased number of applications for demolition of dwellings within the Heritage Protection Area, the City of Stirling Council has been consistent in rejecting such applications. The Mount Lawley Society is particularly grateful of the efforts made by Councillors Paul Collins, Rod Willox, Robin Furlong and Terry Tyzack. Thank you for your hard work. In the two instances when applicants had further challenged Council decision

against demolition, it has also been reassuring to note that the State Administrative Tribunal (SAT) has supported the CoS Council ruling. Let's hope that CoS and SAT maintain their commendable and consistent approach to this important issue.

During 2008, the MLS has formally extended its heritage protection interests to Inglewood and Menora through the engagement of dedicated Inglewood and Menora representatives on the committee. The MLS recognises that a consolidated approach to heritage protection within Menora and Inglewood as well as Mount

Lawley is essential to maintain relevance within our community. The MLS extends a warm welcome to Neil Hodgkinson and Jenny Hewitt who joined the committee as Inglewood representatives. #### **Heritage Awards**

The City of Stirling Heritage Awards ceremony was held on 23<sup>rd</sup> June at the council headquarters. The competition was of a very high standard with many excellent entries. The winner of the residential category was the Bond family who completed a beautiful restoration and extension of their Storthes Street property. Commendations were awarded for a sympathetic extension to a Clotilde Street property and a property development on John Street, Inglewood. The winner of the business category was GP on Beaufort where owner Dr Goran Pervan completed a beautiful restoration to superb detail.



### Streetscape and Park Improvements in Mount Lawley

In July, City of Stirling Council approved \$700k for a streetscape improvement of the Mount Lawley Town Centre as part of the 08/09 budget, supported strongly by Lawley Ward Councillors Rod Willox and Paul Collins. This money should result in new paving and street furniture. Works proposed in Brear Park on Fifth Avenue will install BBQ facilities with appropriate lighting and additional tables with shelter. Hopefully this will prevent local residents from curing meats on the monkey bars and cooking traditional hangi's in the playground sand.

A shade shelter will also be installed over the playground at Copley Park in Regent Street, Mount Lawley. A similar shade shelter was installed over the playground at Alexander Park, Menora in June.

### **DEMOLITION OF HERITAGE LISTED BUILDINGS**

On 30 June 2008 it was announced by the Minister for Heritage Hon Michelle Roberts MLA that heritage vandals will face massive penalties for illegally demolishing heritage-listed places with fines of up to \$1million.

This will mean a significant increase in penalties for illegal demolition and other illegal works affecting heritage-listed places.

The Mount Lawley Society agrees that the current penalties are woefully inadequate. Under the Planning and Development Act the current maximum penalty for illegal works including demolition is \$50,000. Under the Heritage Act, the maximum penalty for unauthorised works on a State-Registered heritage place is a paltry \$5,000.

These penalties simply act as a licence to owners to illegally demolish a place.

As well as an increase in fines, the proposals include a new power to stop development on the site for a set number of years.

The legislation will provide real teeth, to protect our built heritage.

The inadequacy of penalties came to public attention in August last year when a magnificent 100-yearold home at 5 Victoria Ave Claremont was demolished, despite its protected status under the local planning scheme. The demolition outraged many, and MLS has been long expressing its concern about demolition of our built heritage, and has called for stronger controls over demolition in heritage protection areas.

Thankfully the new laws will apply not just to State heritage listed places, of which there are only a handful, but will also apply to places listed on the local government register as well. There will be a two-tiered penalty system, recognising the different levels of significance attached to the State Register and the Local Scheme Registers.

It is hoped that the controls will apply not just to individual houses listed on the local register but also to all properties within heritage protection areas such as Mt Lawley. Otherwise it will be a simple process for owners to opt out of the register to avoid the controls.

Government also needs to ensure that the controls also apply to the common practice of demolition by neglect, where owners turn a blind eye to maintenance, allowing properties to run down and become eyesores in the hope that this will leave authorities no option but to approve demolition.

Penalties for places in the State Register of Heritage Place will be provided under the Heritage of Western Australia Act 1990. The increased penalties are:

- a monetary penalty up to \$1,000,000 and a daily penalty for continuing offences of \$50,000;
- a development moratorium up to 10 years; and
- repair work (whereby the offender is obliged to make good the unauthorised works).

Penalties for places listed in local government town planning schemes will be 50 per cent of the penalties that apply to places listed in the State Register.






Figure 85: Ursula and Sir Arthur relaxing in true Australian style.

In the last issue we provided some information about the family and career of Governor of Western Australia, Sir Arthur Lawley, (April 1901 – 14 August 1902) after whom this suburb was named.

Sir Arthur arrived in Albany on the Orient Line ship 'Ophir' on 30 April, having travelled with George, Duke of York & Cornwall, (later King George V) who was paying a state visit to Australia, and was later to open the first sitting of the Federal Parliament. The Duchess wrote of Sir Arthur 'He is extremely cool'.

After being welcomed in Albany and Perth, the Lawleys later went to Melbourne for the opening ceremony of the Federal Parliament in the Exhibition Building.

Upon arrival back in Perth, Sir Arthur was confronted with a series of political crises. On his arrival, the then Premier, George Throssell, resigned, to be replaced by George Leake.

His task was to rearrange the government departments as a result of the Federal Government taking over certain functions, dealing with consequential restrictions on taxing powers, and amending the Electoral Act to make it more democratic.

On July 20, 1901, the royal visit of the Duke and Duchess of York and Cornwall occurred and Sir Arthur was the host. There was also some social delicacy as the Dukes equerry was Derek Keppel, brother in law of King Edward VII' mistress. The royal visit lasted six days.

The political crisis continued with George Leake being replaced by Alfred Morgans on 21 November, lasting only until 23 December when George Leake again took office.

The Lawleys were very popular as Sir Arthur had a very easy manner, was an entertaining and fluent speaker, and he and his wife, Annie, were willing to adapt to the often fairly primitive conditions as they travelled in the country to Albany, Northam and Kalgoorlie/Coolgardie/Laverton, to the latter on camels. Lady Annie Lawley founded the Lady Lawley Children's Hospital at Cottesloe, and was actively involved in raising the money for it.

Sir Arthur was an early supporter of the idea of national parks. As patron of the Natural History Society, he lobbied to have 65,000 hectares of land between Pinjarra, Bannister and North Dandalup to be set aside as a National Park.

On 31 May, 1902, Sir Arthur was offered the post of Lieutenant Governor of the Transvaal, a challenging

position at the end of the Boer War, as that State had been devastated.



One of his last duties was to lay the foundation stone of the new Parliament building in Perth on July 31 1902. He was officially farewelled on the same day.

Although leaving Western Australia on 14 August 1902, they did pay a return visit in 1927. Lady Lawley visited the Lady Lawley Children's Hospital and Sir Arthur the Fairbridge Farm for boys in Pinjarra in his capacity as Chairman of the Child Immigration Society.

After a successful posting in the Transvaal, in 1906, Sir Arthur became the Governor of Madras (now called Chennai) in India, retiring in 1911.

## THE BOTT FAMILY



Leonidas Cecil Bott (1889 – 1968) was an early resident of Mount Lawley. His father Daniel Reddin Bott (born 1857) with wife Bertha Emily (born 1857) moved from Adelaide, where he worked in a shoe company, to Perth in 1899 to open a store at 533 Hay Street. There were 10 children in the family, born in Adelaide between 1879 and 1899. The family lived at "Blakiston" 42 Bronte Street, East Perth. Daniel Bott died 18 Jan 1936 and Emily Bott 4 July 1934

Leonidas had attended Parkside School in Adelaide, and later attended Perth Boys' School. He excelled in cricket, and because of this skill, he was encouraged by CBC, Perth to complete his secondary education there, where he matriculated to Adelaide University.

At the age of 19,Leonidasjoined the Post Master General's department , where he rose to become the Superintending Engineer. He was transferred to Melbourne for a year in 1936, and to Adelaide from 1937 to 1940 before returning to Perth. Leonidas Bott retired in 1954.

As a young man Leonidas played cricket at A Grade level for Mount Lawley and later for East Perth. He played in the WA Combined 11 between 1912 and 1925, captaining the WA State side in 1922/23. One memorable game was against the visiting MCC team in 1922 (captained by Arthur

Gilligan). Frank and Dick Bride were in his team. He played in 14 State matches, in 24 innings at a batting average of 19.77. Leonidas enjoyed many years playing cricket and was 40 years old before he retired from this game . In 1915 he married Stella May Harrold (1893 - 1966) who was born in Western Australia. They had two children, Cecil Lloyd Harrold (1916 - 2003), and Joan Harrold (1926 -)

Cecil attended Inglewood Primary School (now Mount Lawley), then Hale School. He then studied dentistry in Perth, graduating with a Dip D S. He joined the RAAF, serving in field hospitals in New Guinea. After the war he moved to Kalgoorlie to enter a partnership with Godfrey Braham. The partnership was later dissolved, so Cecil moved to Perth, practising at 220 St George's Terrace. He later joined the State Dental Service.

**J**oan attended Perth College, and then worked for the Australian Broadcasting Commission for 28 years, later moving to the Cancer Council where she worked for 11 years. She married George Edward White (1910 – 1996), a builder.

The first house Leonidas Bott had built in Mount Lawley (1916 - 1925) was at 20 First Avenue, on a double block with a tennis court. The next house he had built (1925 - 1926) was at 12 Regent Street West. He sold that to A St A Barrett-Lennard.

The final house he built (1927 - 1968) was at 82 Lawley Crescent. This house also had a tennis court across the back of the wide block. His daughter, Joan, still lives in the house. ( *another photograph on back page*)

## **RENOVATION OF THE MONTH**

Santo and Sharon Mannino moved into **100 Rookwood Street, Menora** in April 2002 and commenced renovating and extending the house.

The house was built in the 1920's and was owned by Mr and Mrs McNamara. Their son Jim McNamara was Mayor of the City of Stirling 1988/89 and 1991-93.

Santo and Sharon are only the third owners of this house. Though it was a rental property for some years.

Santo subcontracted some of the extensions and renovations but completed much of the work himself.

When Santo and Sharon purchased the house, most of the house was still in its original condition .These features of the house were restored to their original condition .

The front part of the house was unchanged but for the verandah concrete columns (a later edition after the 20's) which were replaced with posts and balustrades. The front steps were removed to the front of the porch rather than the side.


The style of the original jarrah floorboards, cornices, ceiling roses and skirtings was continued through the house into the extension which was built on from the old sleep out.

### **MEMBERS VIEWS: Box trees** by Deryn Thorpe

I love trees! They are the lungs of the city, provide welcome shade on hot days, a home for birds and insects and their leaves and flowers mark the change in the season. However, before I get too carried away with their virtues I want to point out that there is one tree that I do not like in my neighbourhood - the Queensland box tree.

For many years this has been the street tree of choice in Mt Lawley. While I say choice it really is not a choice as it is the tree that Stirling City Council has decided we should have on our/their verges.



While I am pleased that the council is now choosing to plant some other tree varieties on our 'nature strips', the box trees remain the dominant tree in our area.

When they occasionally die, usually the result of a home owner killing them, the council usually replaces them with another box tree as it is their policy to replant with the 'dominant healthy specie'.

Most people can see the value of trees on their verge – so why are they surreptitiously killing the box trees? Box trees (Lophostemon confertus), also known as brush box, are a tree native to the edges of the rain forest in Queensland and Northern NSW.

In these conditions they can get as tall as 35m, though they are unlikely to get taller than 20m in Perth!

The trees are unpopular with householders because they are messy year round. They have a very dense canopy that makes it difficult to grow lawn (or anything else) beneath them, small nuts that are a hazard to people walking on the footpath, and frequently shed leaves which blow around the neighbourhood and are not even good in the compost as they are difficult to break down.

Stirling's Street Tree Maintenance Policy "gives a commitment that street trees will not be canopy reduced in height without justifiable arboricultural cause. The natural shedding of debris such as leaf and fruit drop along with the shading of lawns is part of the normal process of tree growth, and trees will also not be pruned for these reasons."

So now we have underground power and no annual power line pruning, expect that your box trees will keep growing steadily skywards, especially if you are giving them summer water.

While some streets have relatively uniform tree species, my street, First Ave, is a hotch potch of assorted trees. There are jacarandas (which I love), cape lilacs (which are beautiful but messy), box, fiddlewood, eucalyptus etc etc.

I would like to see streets like this planted in the one specie (not box) to give a sense of continuity to the street-scape.

All the majestic cape lilac trees in Clifton Avenue were removed recently (due to borer insect I think) and replaced with jacarandas. While it did look a bit bare, in a year or two the street will again be leafy, green and have a matching show of intense blue flowers in summer.

Perhaps one day the box trees will also meet the same fate.

## Statements from the electoral candidates about Mount Lawley

#### Labor candidate: Karen Brown

In times of rapid growth it is essential that we remain vigilant to the need to protect our heritage areas.

The work of The Mt Lawley Society in the past three decades has done much to preserve the heritage of the area in which I have lived for many years.

I know there are still difficult issues to address such as inconsistent density zonings and the demolition of original homes instead of their renovation.

If elected I will work to help resolve these issues and try to resist the continuing loss of public parkland to higher density developments.

I support the society's aims of fostering community spirit while promoting Mt Lawley as a special heritage area.

#### Liberal Candidate: Michael Sutherland

I am the current Deputy Lord Mayor of the City of Perth and have served the community for 18 years as a councillor.

I feel I have the experience necessary to work with your society to preserve the unique character of Mt Lawley.

I have a good understanding of the planning process and feel as your local member I could bring my experience to bear to ensure orderly planning.

As a former History teacher I understand the importance of preserving history.

I believe the society needs more public exposure to promote its aims. For example your photographic collection should be on public display.

The society should have an input into planning decisions for the area.

#### Town of Vincent proposed policy for multiple dwellings: Amendment 53

The Town of Vincent has prepared a new policy relating to multiple dwellings which will allow multiple dwellings to be built anywhere within the Town. Previously multiple dwellings were not allowed in some parts of the Town.

Multiple dwellings are where a dwelling is above another (blocks of units) which are different to grouped dwellings which are side by side.

A new policy has been prepared which will allow multiple dwellings where the block size is at least 1,000 sq m. The Town Planning Scheme will also be changed to remove the current restrictions regarding multiple dwellings in some precincts.

The policy requires that the multiple dwellings be designed to "fit into" the existing character of the streetscape in terms of height and setbacks.

The policy will allow a height of up to 5 stories along major roads. The major roads listed in the policy are *Beaufort, Bulwer, Charles, East Parade, Fitzgerald, Guildford, Loftus, London, Lord, Newcastle, Oxford Street (north of Richmond Street only), Scarborough Beach Road, Vincent, Walcott and William Streets. The policy is available for reading on www.vincent.wa.gov.au.* 

MLS put in a submission on behalf of members of the Mt Lawley Society as many of Mount Lawley heritage houses border these major roads.

The Council met on the 26.8.08 to consider this matter.

## **INGLEWOOD ISSUES**



#### **DUNDAS RD STREETSCAPE**

Inglewood is at a crossroads:

Many heritage homes have been lovingly restored and/or renovated to a high standard that is in sympathy with their early 20<sup>th</sup> Century origins. Where these homes stand side by side, they create a pleasing streetscape that has an ambience that cannot be emulated by the newer suburbs. It is this quality that has drawn people to the suburb and seen property prices rise.

It is alarming, therefore, to discover that, in recent times, a number of heritage homes have been demolished to make way for higher density living, changing the streetscape permanently. This very same affliction threatened Mount Lawley over 30 years ago and saw the formation of the Mount Lawley Society who successfully saved their suburb.

Inglewood is such a small suburb that every heritage building plays an important role in its character. Mount Lawley Society has generously taken up the cause for Inglewood, aiming to preserve the remaining buildings; however we need the support of Inglewood residents to truly have an impact on what happens to both of these unique suburbs.

### Letters to the Editor:

**Councillor Stephanie Getty (Balga Ward )**: "I would like to also offer some more information on the graffiti issue (I did have a laugh at the tagging of the neighbour's property). I volunteer with the City of Stirling to paint out the graffiti and would recommend that your members might be interested in doing this. I find it very rewarding when the vandals give up and either stop it or move to another suburb that doesn't have the volunteers. I started out doing it 3 times a week and now it is around twice a month. You can choose to do a street or a block or the entire suburb. The City supplies all the paint and brushes plus safety gear.
